This step demonstrated our small efforts towards inclusive and globally relevant education.

Our staff mobility programmes continue to grow increasingly, facilitating exchanges of both academic and administrative between our university and partners. We have proudly participated in international partnership weeks and short-term teaching mobilities with esteemed institutions such as the International University of Logistics and Transport in Poland, DHBW Ravensburg in Germany, Metropolia University of Applied Sciences in Finland, the University of Social and Media Culture in Toruń, and Vilnius University in Lithuania.



These collaborations enrich our staff professionally as they bring back valuable insights that strengthen our teaching, research, and administration, while enhancing the university's global visibility and academic standing. At the same time, we've welcomed inspiring visitors to NUST. This year, our Faculty of Human Science, Commerce and Education hosted a distinguished Professor of Sport Science, and we were equally delighted to receive Hungarian academics for a staff exchange in the Department of Logistics and Sport Management. These visits not only broaden perspectives but also remind us how interconnected our academic communities truly are.

Our partnership with the University of Oradea in Romania under the Erasmus+ 2021-2027 Blended Mobility Programme continues to grow, opening up new opportunities for collaborative teaching and learning that combine physical and virtual exchange.



Similarly, our ties with Spanish universities have deepened, especially through our long-standing relationship with the University of Málaga, where our shared passion for language and cultural exchange has fostered meaningful experiences on both sides.

Through our agreement with the B360 Education Partnerships Programme that has been in place since 2009, we continue to see encouraging growth in the number of students undertaking internships in various fields and industries in Switzerland. These internships provide invaluable hands-on experience, exposure to international work environments, and the development of global competencies that our graduates will carry into their professional careers. The B360 programme at the same time also facilitates mobility of Swiss experts into our academic activities across all faculties of which this year of 2025 Seven [7] Swiss Experts joined our Faculty of Health, Natural Resources and Applied Sciences.

As we celebrate a decade of NUST's existence as a university this year, we take pride in the Department's division of International Relations continued efforts to formalise partnerships through Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs), and in facilitating the hosting diplomatic guests and representatives from local businesses, national institutions, and regional academic partners. These engagements affirm our reputation as a reliable knowledge partner within Namibia and beyond. Our active affiliation with the Association of African Universities (AAU) and its regional body the Association of African Universities for Southern Africa (AAU SARO), as well as our ongoing involvement in global university ranking initiatives, bears testimony to our department's dedication to advancing the university's internationalisation agenda. These milestones speak of a story of progress - one of a university that is confidently positioning itself as a hub of research in science and technology and innovation, and a leader in collaboration in the same field offering academic excellence on the African continent. This year of 2025, our department proudly embarked on the pivotal work of developing the university's internationalisation policy, laying the foundation for a more connected and globally engaged future. ## International Partners Week

# First International Partner Week a Success

A new standard in the internationalisation of higher education in Namibia has been set by the International Relations (IR) section under the Department of Corporate Engagement and Internationalisation at the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST), after hosting its first 2024 International Partner Week (IPW). Held from 04 to 08 November 2024, under the theme, "Cultural Competence for Diversity and Inclusion in Higher Education," the IPW hosted a week-long training event for administrative and academic staff members from its network of partner universities abroad.

In an increasingly globalised world, higher education institutions hold a crucial role in promoting internationalisation and cross-cultural understanding to demonstrate their commitment to advancing internationalisation. Thus, it has become a standard practice for International Relations offices at higher education institutions worldwide to organise and host week-long training programmes for administrative or academic staff from universities within their international partner networks commonly known as International Staff Week (ISW) or IPW. "Staff at NUST, particularly from the International Relations Section, have been fortunate enough to attend similar international training weeks at universities in Europe and South Africa. We thought it would be an interesting and rewarding challenge to organise and host such an event at NUST," said Nico Smit, the NUST IPW Coordinator.

Usually the objective of ISW/IPW is to focus on specific themes and include workshops, seminars, and training sessions alongside networking events and cultural excursions to enhance professional development, promote cross-cultural competence, and strengthen international networks. The NUST 2024 IPW accommodated 21 participants from 11 universities across five European nations and was attended by participants from Germany, Austria, Finland, Switzerland and Lithuania. Beaming with pride, Smit is certain that the planning and organising of the NUST IPW, while hosting it for the first time, was a substantial success, and milestone moment for the IR Section, and the university at large. "We are incredibly proud of what we have achieved. This was an opportunity for us to learn, grow, and develop as professionals, and as a team," he said.

The IPW participants each delivered a presentation on the policies and formal approaches taken by their home universities to foster cultural diversity and promote inclusivity. Suvi Ruippo, International Relations Advisor at Metropolia University of Applied Sciences, Finland, delivered a presentation on the Inclusive Comprehensive Internationalisation (ICI) Project, which aims to enhance global learning opportunities for all students. This is a multi-year, five-partner consortium project of which the Metropolia University of Applied Sciences is a participant. A key event of the IPW was a roundtable discussion featuring Namibian students that had participated in Erasmus+ or German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) funded semester mobilities abroad. During this session the participants heard first-hand accounts of the challenges faced by young Namibians taking international mobilities.

With cultural exploration and exchange being a primary objective of the IPW, the event participants enjoyed numerous opportunities to expand their horizons. Included in the programme was a Food Sharing and Cultural Evening, where all participants brought along and shared food and drinks typical of their home country or region. The NUST IR Team put to the test the adventurous nature of the IPW participants, offering traditional Namibian delicacies such as Smileys, Matangara, Marathon Chicken, and Chicken Feet. Also included in the programme was a tour of Windhoek city, culminating in a visit at the Katutura Single Quarters, where the participants had the opportunity to sample Kapana and Vetkoek.

The 2024 IPW ended with a visit to Harnas Wildlife Foundation and Guest Farm near Gobabis in the Omaheke region. Here the participants took part in the Ancient San Skills Academy, which exposed them to traditional San culture, touching on survival in the bush, traditional medicine, hunting techniques and animal tracking.

## SIAN Calls for Internationalisation Beyond Mobilities

The Stellenbosch International Academic Network (SIAN) Partner Week held in Western Cape, South Africa, in March this year emphasised that internationalisation must transcend mobility metrics.

The gathering brought together higher education institutions from across the globe to deepen international cooperation and reflect on responsible global engagement. SIAN reinforced the importance of responsible internationalisation that prioritises mutual benefit, social impact, and contextual relevance, particularly within the Global South.

The Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST) was represented by Ms Yatva Hind, International Relations Officer, who participated in strategic dialogues, networked with current and potential partners, and engaged in critical discussions on the evolving role of international relations in higher education.

A key message echoed throughout the week was that internationalisation is more than staff and students mobilities. Speaker after speaker called for academic global collaborations which support global justice and offer a framework for institutions to realign their internationalisation agendas. As Prof Luciane Stallivieri from the Federal University of Santa Catarina, Brazil, noted: "Internationalisation should be a behaviour, not a department".

Panel discussions and workshops offered a refreshing perspective on partnership typologies, advocating for tailored engagements based on the depth and nature of collaboration. Whether research-focused, mobility-based, or centred on capacity building, categorising partnerships enables better alignment of expectations, resources, and institutional strategies. The importance of accountability was also highlighted, with recommendations to adopt clear governance structures, define performance indicators, and utilise agile evaluation tools to track partnership impact over time.



## NUST Explores Strategic Partnership with University of Warwick

The Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST) is currently in discussions with the University of Warwick in Coventry, United Kingdom, to establish a partnership in areas such as Business and Management, Computer Science, and Information Technology.

The dialogue was initiated during a meeting between Professor Daniel Branch, Deputy Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Africa) and Academic Director of the Doctoral College at Warwick, and Mr Nashilongo Gervasius, Acting Director of Corporate Engagement and Internationalisation at NUST. Professor Branch had earlier attended NUST's recent graduation ceremony as a guest speaker.

Discussions centred on faculty collaboration, with both institutions exploring opportunities for joint research projects, curriculum development, and the exchange of best practices in teaching. Further areas of interest included dual-degree programmes in Business, Engineering, Computer Science, and Environmental Sciences. Another exciting proposal under review is the establishment of a joint Innovation and Entrepreneurship Hub to support start-ups targeting both African and European markets.

Also present at the meeting were Professor Franklyn Lisk, Co-Director for Africa in the International Strategy and Relations team, and Ms Sally Smith, Director of International Strategy and Relations at Warwick.

The Warwick delegation to Namibia comprised seven members, including Mr Sachdev Nilesbhaji Jayantilal, the incoming Chair of the University Council, and Professor Stuart Croft, Vice-Chancellor and President of the University. Their visit was also marked by a special celebration in honour of Warwick's seventh Chancellor, Advocate Bience Gawanas.

The celebration, held at the NUST Hotel School, featured presentations, speeches, and an alumni panel that engaged with current Warwick students and staff.

Reflecting on the visit, Professor Branch emphasised that both the engagements with NUST and the Chancellor's celebration underscored Warwick's commitment to forging deep, strategic partnerships across Africa, while strengthening its reputation as a truly global university.

## NUST Partners with EU to Host Higher Education Fair 2025

The International Relations Office (IRO) at NUST partnered with the European Union (EU) Delegation to Namibia, member states, and other local universities for the 2025 edition of the EU Higher Education Fair in June 2025.

As NUST celebrates its 10-year anniversary, IRO found the event fitting as a celebration of the University's decade of eminence and its continuous partnership with the EU. Fourteen exhibitors from various institutes excitedly engaged with students and stakeholders on what they had to offer - ranging from undergraduate, postgraduate and PhD opportunities as well as capacity-building and professional development programmes. IRO prides itself in facilitating exchanges of this calibre with student and staff exchanges, faculty visits and ensuring all memoranda of understanding are implemented to the benefit of the institutions involved.

The EU Higher Education Fair was officially opened by the Vice-Chancellor, Prof Erold Naomab, while H.E. Ms Ana Beatriz Martins, the European Union Ambassador to Namibia, Deputy Executive Director Ms Edda Bohn from the Ministry of Education, Innovation, Youth, Sport, Arts, and Culture and Hon Mbahimwa Fenny Tutjavi, member of Parliament, delivered remarks.

Prof Naomab reiterated that "internationalisation of higher education is increasingly becoming a strategic policy objective of many universities, and as education changes globally, the need to produce holistic graduates with the requisite knowledge, skills, values, and attitudes to function in diverse cultural and competitive global contexts has increased too."

Over the past five years, NUST has sent more than 100 students and staff for exchanges to Europe through Erasmus+ mobilities, as well as participated in several EU member states mobilities and scholarship educational programmes facilitated by the IRO.

The fair offered an opportunity to strengthen existing partnerships, create collaborative opportunities, and build new networks. NUST exchange students from various faculties shared their experiences with fellow students from application, studies and cultural perspectives.

Speaker after speaker urged universities to continue encouraging staff and students to pursue various opportunities and provide education fit for global citizens.

Namibian universities have a collective responsibility to internationalise education, and there is no other better enabler than the EU-Namibia Higher Education Fair 2025.

## Nurture Higher Education Group

Speaking at the signing ceremony, NUST Vice-Chancellor, Prof Erol Naomab, highlighted the importance of such partnerships, stating that "this agreement paves the way for transformative academic engagement, providing our students and staff with invaluable global exposure."

Representing the Nurture Higher Education Group, Mr Oscar Colin praised NUST's forward-thinking approach. "NUST is at the forefront of embracing internationalisation, and we are excited to collaborate in shaping the future of transnational education," he said.

## Foundation for Information Technology Accessibility (FITA)

This partnership seeks to enhance digital accessibility and develop innovative solutions that support less abled students.

The signing ceremonies were attended by distinguished guests, including Dominic McVey, Honourary Consul of Namibia to Wales; H.E Linda Scott, High Commissioner to the UK, Malta, Greece and Ireland; and Charles Moore, representing the British High Commissioner to Namibia.

H.E Scott passionately spoke about advancing international growth between Europe and Africa, leveraging on different areas that equally benefit all parties involved.

## Polish University Welcomes NUST Academics


Three lecturers from NUST's Faculty of Commerce, Human Sciences and Education spent a week at the International University of Logistics and Transport (IULT), Poland, on international staff exchange which saw them lecture and provide Namibian perspectives to Polish students on global topics.

**Dr Gloria Tshoopara, Head of the Department of Marketing, Logistics, and Sport Management, Prof Nikodemus Angula, Head of the Department of Governance and Management Sciences, and Mr Moses Shuuya, a Management Sciences Lecturer,** travelled to Wroclaw, Poland, during May 2025 to visit IULT on Erasmus+ funded exchanges.

The three NUST academics participated in IULT's Global Webinars, a series of seminars delivered by global academics and experts in the Transportation, Forwarding and Logistics (TFL) industry.

Dr Tshoopara's participation in the Global Webinar Series saw her deliver a lecture on Road and Rail Transportation Systems, allowing her to share African transportation perspectives. For his seminar, Prof Angula gave a talk on Business Information Systems, while Mr Shuuya delivered a lecture on the Framework for the Management of Technological Innovations. The seminars delivered by the NUST lecturers were well attended by IULT staff and students alike, and each was followed by lively engagement and dialogue.

The three NUST staff members also had the opportunity to deliver guest lectures to IULT students as part of their normal curriculum. Prof Angula, Mr Shuuya and Dr Tshoopara presented topics to IULT students that are taught at NUST, and in this way introduced the Polish students to new concepts and contexts, providing a globalised perspective that will broaden understanding application.



This was a second visit to IULT for Dr Tshoopara, who had visited the Wroclaw-based university in 2023. "I am very happy to have been given the opportunity to return to IULT, and deepen the connections made two years ago," she said. During the visit Dr Tshoopara also met with representatives from IULT's International Relations Department, where discussions revolved around opportunities for strategic collaboration in the field of Transport and Logistics. "Joint curriculum development, and the integration of eLearning strategies to enhance knowledge exchange across borders were key focus areas that we touched on," she commented.

For both Mr Shuuya and Prof Angula, this was their first visit to IULT. They both made the most of the opportunity to broaden their professional networks and lay the foundation for collaborative projects with academics from IULT.

"It has been a great learning experience, and participating in the Global Webinars Series was a wonderful opportunity to gain exposure, to put ourselves out there, to showcase what NUST and Namibia has to offer and build the reputation of our university," Prof Angula said. His sentiments were shared by Mr Shuuya, who said that teaching foreign students in a new environment had been a very enriching and rewarding experience.

Dr Tshoopara also met with Chrisley Dlamine, a NUST student who was on an Erasmus+ funded semester exchange at IULT. Between 2022 and 2025 seven international mobilities from NUST to IULT have taken place. Three have been students, each taking part in a semester exchange while four have been staff exchanges.



## NUST Represented at Metropolia IPW, Again!

For the third year running an academic from the Namibia University of Science and Technology travelled to Helsinki, Finland, to participate in the International Project Week (IPW), an internationalisation activity that brings together students and academics from across the world.

**Dr Gloria Tshoopara, Head of the Department of Marketing, Logistics and Sport Management**, participated in the 21<sup>st</sup> IPW at Metropolia, becoming only the fourth academic from NUST to participate in this prestigious activity. The IPW is an annual event, organised and hosted by the Helsinki-based university, where international students and faculty collaborate on projects related to a specific business theme, often focusing on sustainability and corporate social responsibility.

This year the IPW took place from 12 – 16 May 2025. The week-long event involves lectures and workshops facilitated by academics, from Metropolia and that university's network of international partner institutions, and project work culminating in student presentations. Business Management students from Metropolia and its partner universities attend the IPW lectures and are divided into mixed groups for the project work and presentations. The initiative aims to foster cross-cultural collaboration, knowledge exchange, and the development of innovative solutions to real-world business challenges.

At the 2025 IPW Dr Tshoopara delivered lectures focused on Sustainable Transportation in Namibia, with particular emphasis on business ethics, green logistics, mode choice, and accessibility.



Her sessions had a high attendance rate from among students and faculty members, leading to insightful discussions. "My participation in Metropolia's IPW was a thoroughly rewarding academic experience, and the event's theme, "Sustainability and Corporate Social Responsibility," set the stage for rich engagement, innovation and cross-cultural learning," Dr Tshoopara said.

The NUST academic also had the opportunity to coach a group of undergraduate and postgraduate students on a sustainability case focused on rail transportation in Namibia, with TransNamib as the subject.

"Despite only having online access to company information, the students demonstrated remarkable critical thinking and analytical skills, crafting a well-informed presentation that reflected their grasp of both global sustainability principles and regional transport dynamics," she said.

Dr Tshoopara added that this kind of international problem-solving exercise not only deepened their understanding of the complexities involved in sustainable infrastructure but also reinforced the valued global learning perspectives in higher education.

The IPW also included a well curated social programme, which further elevated the experience, offering cultural immersion, networking with fellow academics, and exposure to Helsinki's sustainability initiatives and architectural heritage. Dr Tshoopara's participation in the Metropolia IPW was made possible through an International Credit Mobility (ICM) funded by Erasmus+.



## NUST Represented at DHBW Ravensburg International Partnership Week

Two NUST staff members, **Kuda Brandt** and **Cheryl Kahatjipara**, recently travelled to Germany to represent the university at the International Partnership Week, hosted by Duale Hochschule Baden-Württemberg (DHBW) Ravensburg. Funded by the Erasmus+ programme and facilitated by NUST's International Relations office, the event brought together university professionals from around the world to foster collaboration and share best practices in higher education.

During the week-long engagement, the NUST representatives participated in numerous sessions and interactive discussions covering a wide range of topics relevant to global higher education. "Something that particularly piqued my interest was Germany's free education system," said Brandt from the Corporate Engagement and Internationalisation Department. "I believe public lectures and panel discussions could serve as effective platforms to engage key stakeholders and raise awareness about the growing movement toward tuition-free tertiary education."



For Gaseb, it was imperative to promote and honour collaboration and partnership within the two universities, whilst engaging in conversations to share challenges faced by students and staff when participating in semester exchange programmes.



The visit enables staff cohesion among NUST colleagues for better support with IR activities, enhanced employee experiences and cultural exchange. "One of the top priorities of a visit such as this is to continuously build better strategies for enhancing student and staff exchange programmes by exchanging best practices in Erasmus+ mobility management", emphasised Gaseb.

"The approach of the Finnish education system would benefit Namibian students because of its practical and industrial approach. The emphasis on real-world projects and collaborations with companies can have a fundamental impact on the overall learning experience, but this goal can only be achieved if we develop and foster a deep understanding of cross-cultural collaboration," Izaks narrated.

Other Universities which attended the ISW were the Durban University of Technology (South Africa) and Lakehead University (Canada).

Sharing his visit experience, Mutrifa exclaimed excitement through the experience and shared how "enhancing digital infrastructure is an investment in smart learning environments by ensuring well-equipped facilities that support innovation and collaboration."

Overall, exchange programmes facilitated by the International Office are important because they offer transformative thinking, educational, cultural and professional benefits for students and staff.



# Journalism and Digital Arts Lecturers Visit Poland





Two academics from the Departments of Journalism and Media Technology and Digital Arts and Animation, respectively, travelled to the hometown of famous Polish astronomer, Nicolaus Copernicus, for a week-long exchange to the University of Social and Media Culture of Torun [AKSiM].

*Dr Hugh Ellis, a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Journalism and Media Technology, and Jordaania Andima, a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Digital Arts and Animation, travelled to Torun during the 2025 first semester for international exchanges. Their exchanges were made possible through International Credit Mobility (ICM) grants funded by Erasmus+.*

During their visit to AKSiM, Dr Ellis and Ms Andima lectured students at the Polish university on numerous topics. These included Photojournalistic Coverage of Disasters and Conflicts in the Global South, the Symbolic Significance of Herero Culture in Namibia, the Potential Risks of Using Artificial Intelligence in Newsrooms, and the Ethical Use of Social Media by Journalists. Dr Ellis and Ms Andima also delivered presentations at AKSiM's International Conference, New Media: #Credibility.

"This was my first visit to AKSiM and Poland, more generally, and I must say that it was been an incredibly rewarding experience, both professionally and personally," Dr Ellis commented of the exchange. He added that the exposure to new and different methods and strategies for teaching and learning, and the opportunity to present at an international conference were key moments that stood out for him.

For Ms Andima, this trip marked a return to Torun as she had previously visited the institution in 2022. "I am very happy and honoured to have had the opportunity to return to AKSiM to once again lecture students, and this time deliver a presentation at a prestigious conference," she said.

As part of their visit, Dr Ellis and Ms Andima were also given a tour of AKSiM's TV station studio, where they had a chance to exchange ideas with the studio manager and learn more about the station's operations. The NUST academics also had an opportunity to meet with Prof. Veslava Osinska and Prof Anna Rakowska, both lecturers at AKSiM who will visit NUST in the 2025 second semester. They also met with Priskilla Petrus, a Journalism and Media Technology student from NUST, who took an Erasmus+ funded semester exchange to AKSiM in the first half of 2025.

The partnership between NUST and AKSiM, while still relatively young, has seen a number of student and staff exchanges take place. Since 2022, 6 NUST staff members have visited AKSiM, while 6 students from the institution have each spent a semester at the Polish university. In 2023 NUST hosted 3 staff members from AKSiM for exchange and is expecting another three academics from Poland in August 2025 and September 2025.



# NUST Staff Attend International Staff Week in Lithuania

Two administrative staff members from NUST travelled to the eastern European nation of Lithuania in May 2025 to participate in an International Staff Training Week at Vilnius University (VU).

Both **Cindy van Wyk**, *NUST Public Relations Officer*, and **Helena Shipanga**, Senior Business Development Coordinator: Entrepreneurship Development Academy at the Harold Pupkowitz Graduate School of Business, participated in an international staff exchange for the first time in 2025 as they visited the Lithuanian state capitol for a week-long professional development event. Their participation in this event was made possible through Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility Grants.

VU annually organises and hosts an International Staff Training Week, with the 2025 training themed around "Strategic International Communication." The event provides a platform for administrative and academic staff from its network of international partner institutions to share experiences, learn from experts and engage with the academic and cultural environment of Vilnius University.

This year the event brought together university staff from Montenegro, Georgia, Germany, Jordan, Namibia, and the Ukraine, amongst others. Included in the programme was a workshop on Strategic International Communication, and a seminar on changes that the human brain undergoes over time.





Apart from formal training and professional development activities, the event programme also included cultural activities, such as a tour to the city of Kaunas and visit to Lithuania's first Science and Innovation Promotion Centre.

"This has been an eye-opening and deeply enriching experience," van Wyk said, adding that the opportunity to travel internationally for staff exchange had been very rewarding. She pointed to the informal networking opportunities with staff from across the world, and the exposure to new and different work systems and processes that stood out the most for her. For Shipanga the workshop and seminar were standout components of the VU International Staff Training Week. "The topics were covered in depth, but in an engaging and very practical way, making it easy for participants to apply to their work," Shipanga said.

During their time in Lithuania, van Wyk and Shipanga also met with Eleanor Linno and Ashleigh Chabvuta, two NUST students taking a semester exchange at VU.

The participation of the two NUST staff members in the VU International Staff Training Week underscores NUST's ongoing commitment to strengthening its international footprint and enriching the global perspectives of its staff. Between 2022 and 2025, eight international mobilities took place between NUST and VU. Four students from NUST each undertook a five-month semester exchange, while 2 staff from VU visited NUST to participate in the Namibian university's International Partner Week in 2024. Van Wyk and Shipanga's international exchanges from NUST to VU were the last two mobilities to take place in the three-year cycle.

A delegation of ten [10] staff members from the Namibia University of Science and Technology [NUST] travelled to Spain to attend the International Partnership Week 2025 hosted by the University of Huelva [UHU]. The week-long event brought together faculty, researchers, and administrators from across the globe to engage in knowledge exchange, benchmarking, capacity building, and institutional networking.

Several bilateral meetings were also held between the NUST delegation and host faculty at the University of Huelva, focusing on building pathways for sustainable academic collaboration.

## Hungarian Academics Visit NUST for Teaching Staff Exchange

Two senior academics from the University of Debrecen (UD), Hungary, visited the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST) during May 2025 as guest lecturers, teaching students and establishing connections with staff at the institution.


*Prof István Szűcs, Head of the Institute of Economics in the Department of Agricultural Policy and Environmental Economics at UD, and Dr Kristián Kovác, an Assistant Professor also at the Institute of Economics, undertook a week-long staff exchange, hosted by the Department of Agricultural Sciences and Agribusiness. Their exchange to NUST was made possible through Erasmus+, and contributed to international academic collaboration and cultural exchange.*

During their stay, they added significant value to the academic environment by delivering guest lectures and thereby exposing NUST students to international perspectives.

The lectures covered topics related to Research Methodology and Applied Project Management, providing students with valuable insights into global practices and frameworks. Beyond imparting knowledge in the classroom, the visit also served as an opportunity to establish meaningful connections with staff members, paving the way for future collaborations between the two institutions.

During their time in Namibia, the Hungarian academics participated in site visits to Gondwana Collection Namibia, Namibia Dairies, and Meatco.

Through these visits, Prof Szűcs and Dr Kovác engaged with industry practitioners and were exposed to agribusinesses. They were able to gain first-hand insight into the workings of Namibian businesses in these sectors and also share knowledge and insights of similar operations in Hungary.



“Visiting Namibia has been a wonderful experience - from our engagement with academics, lecturing the very keen, motivated and engaged students to meeting with industry representatives,” Prof Szücs said when asked about their exchange. These sentiments were echoed by Dr Kováć, who added that being a first-time visitor to the African continent, Namibia exceeded his expectations.

Staff exchanges between universities are grounded in the aim of fostering global partnerships in education, enabling academic institutions to share expertise and broaden perspectives. The hosting of international academics at NUST is a key component of the institution’s strategy for internationalisation at home.

This extends the reach of internationalisation activities, as more staff and students are exposed to global views, international perspective and new cultures.

The visit to NUST by the academics from UD not only strengthened ties between the two universities, but also underscored the mutual benefits of such exchanges in creating a dynamic and inclusive academic landscape. Later in 2025, two administrative staff members from NUST will take Erasmus+ funded exchanges to UD for the purpose of benchmarking, job-shadowing, identification of collaborative projects, and further strengthening the relationship between the two institutions.



## B360 Experts Share Knowledge and Experience with NUST Students

Six Swiss-based industry experts visited NUST in the 2025 first semester as volunteer guest lecturers, as the B360 Sending South Programme continued its legacy of skills transfer between European professionals and undergraduate students in Namibia.

**Tobias Furrer, Markus Hübscher and Prof Corinne Gantenbein** got the 2025 B360 expert volunteer assignments at NUST underway, arriving in Namibia in mid-February. Furrer and Hübscher visited the Faculty of Health, Natural Resources and Applied Sciences, where they taught senior Environmental Health Sciences (EHS) students. The two delivered B360's Career Starter Week workshop during the first week of their assignment and focused on project management during their final week.

Speaking about their experience at NUST, the two experts highlighted the connections they formed with Namibian students and witnessing these individuals grow and develop over a very short period of time as the highlight of their trip. "It was amazing to see how quickly they grasped and applied new concepts in creative and imaginative ways," Furrer said.

Prof Gantenbein, a retired Food Microbiologist formerly from the Zurich University of Applied Sciences, has visited NUST on numerous occasions in the past. She led microbiology practicals for third-year EHS students.

Prof Gantenbein has, over the years, become well acquainted with NUST staff in the Department of Preventative Health Sciences and the International Relations Unit. Her previous exposure to NUST students has proven irresistible. The lure of working with eager, intelligent and inquisitive African youth has been the key factor motivating her decision to return to NUST on an annual basis. "It is very rewarding to be able to spend a little bit of time with these amazing young people, and to pass on to them some of my knowledge and skills," she said.

Meanwhile, Miklós Soltész, a certified Safety Engineer and the Head of Logistics at Cosanum AG, returned to NUST for the second time in 2025. He too lectured students in the Preventative Health Sciences Department. Amongst other topics, he lectured Occupational Health and Safety Auditing, Accident Investigation and Prevention, and Emergency Preparedness and Response in the workplace. An avid footballer, Soltész also participated in training sessions with the NUST Soccer Club while he visited the Institution.



"I have had an incredibly enriching experience in Namibia in general, and in particular at NUST," Soltész said of his trip. He added that the engagement with students and lecturers created a new dimension in work-related travel that he had not experienced previously. "The staff in the Preventative Health Sciences Department are excellent. I think the students are lucky to have such knowledgeable and dedicated individuals at their disposal," he said.

The last B360 Expert to arrive at NUST for the 2025 first semester was Dr Marcus Schuppler, who taught Medical Microbiology to students in the Health Sciences Department. A lecturer in Microbiology at the Federal Institute of Technology Zurich (ETH Zurich), Dr Schuppler had visited NUST on numerous occasions in the past. In fact, Dr Schuppler delivered remote, online lectures to NUST students during the height of the Covid-19 pandemic when international travel was restricted. "It was very exciting to have another in-person teaching assignment at NUST, following the virtual teaching during the Covid pandemic," Dr Schuppler said.

Noting the growth of student enrolment in the Medical Laboratory Science programme at NUST, Dr Schuppler lauded the support, commitment, and dedication of the academic and administrative staff in the department for contributing to the success of his lecturing assignment. "The positive feedback from the local staff on the impact of my assignment has been very rewarding and hugely encouraging, and I am happy that my efforts will positively impact the education of their students," he said.

The six B360 experts taught for a total of 15 weeks and reached well over 300 students during this time. Since its inception in 2009, well over 130 Swiss-based industry experts have undertaken volunteer lecturing assignments to NUST under the B360 Sending South Programme. This initiative is therefore a significant contributor to the skills and knowledge transfer between experienced industry professionals, academics and university students in Namibia. NUST and B360 Education Partnerships have been in partnership for 15 years.



## Visiting Professor from Huelva University meets Hon Dino Ballotti

The Department of Marketing, Logistics and Sport Management in the Faculty of Commerce, Human Sciences and Education at the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST) hosted **Professor Pedro Sáenz-López Buñuel**, a lecturer and expert in Motivation and Emotional Intelligence from Huelva University, Spain, during July 2025.

Professor Sáenz-López Buñuel, who is a coach in Sport Science and a passionate athletic development lecturer, had a hectic schedule while at NUST, culminating in an impromptu meeting with Hon Dino Ballotti, Deputy Minister of Education, Innovation, Youth, Sports, Arts and Culture.



## NUST Strengthens Ties with University of Oradea through Erasmus+ Blended Mobility

NUST recently participated in a blended mobility initiative from the University of Oradea, Romania, under the Erasmus+ 2021–2027 programme. This innovative model combines virtual and short-term physical mobility, offering flexible international learning and collaboration opportunities.

The two NUST students who are from the Department of Marketing, Logistics and Sport Management in the Faculty of Commerce Management Science and Education, were joined by other fellow exchange students from Mexico, Taiwan, Turkey, Chile, South Africa, Ruanda, India, Bhutan, and Canada.

NUST and DHBW have been partners for over a decade. Exchange mobilities are sponsored by European Union [EU] Erasmus Mobilities Programme.



# Six NUST Students Complete Swiss Internships

Mechanical Engineering, Journalism and Media Technology, and Communications students from the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST) spent three months in Switzerland during the 2025 first semester doing internships at companies in that country. The end of January 2025 saw the departure of six NUST students for the central European nation, as they embarked on a journey that would see them gain invaluable work experience and life skills. **Llewellyn Poulton, Delcia Muafeca, Quinteline Nunuhe, Renee Sapala, Mirjam Nakatana and Nadia Filex** embarked on a life-changing adventure as they prepared for placements in world-renowned organisations. During their stay in Switzerland, they were placed with host families, giving them a true taste of Swiss life, and enriching their cultural experience.

Poulton, a Mechanical Engineering student, was placed with Hivoduct AG, a tech startup that specialises in the development of sustainable electrical energy transmission technologies. The Communications students, Muafeca and Nakatana, were placed with Mediaschneider AG and LGT Bank Ltd, respectively. Mediaschneider is Switzerland's leading independent media agency. Sapala and Nunuhe, both Journalism and Media Technology students, were placed with Julius Bar and LGT Bank Ltd respectively. Lastly, Felix, also a Mechanical Engineering student, was placed with Büchi Labrotechnik AG, a leading laboratory equipment manufacturer.

When asked about her experience in Europe, Felix said she had a wonderful internship, filled with moments of learning and personal development at home and at work. "My time at work was very thoughtfully structured; I spent time on the assembly line, but also in a number of other departments, giving me the opportunity to be involved in different stages of product development and organisational departments," she said.

Speaking about his experience at Hivoduct AG, Poulton said he had the opportunity to work in a dynamic and supportive environment that encouraged growth and learning. "This experience enhanced my technical and soft skills, especially in problem-solving and time management." He added that on the whole, the Swiss internship had not only broadened his horizons, but also deepened his sense of purpose.

Muafeca echoed their sentiments, adding that working in a Swiss business environment helped her develop essential life skills such as teamwork, time management, creative thinking, and effective communication. "The company really offered me the perfect space to grow both personally and professionally," she said.

In March 2025, the next cohort of NUST students set to travel to Switzerland in the second half of the year for internships were selected. For this intake of the B360 Internship Programme, five students from the Faculty of Health, Natural Resources and the Faculty of Commerce, Human Sciences and Education were selected.

"We are very happy that such a large number of NUST students will participate in the B360 Internship Programme this year," NUST International Relations Officer, Nico Smit, said. He added that the total of 11 students doing internships in Switzerland in 2025 is the second highest number that have participated in the B360 Northbound Programme – just behind 2023's 12 students.

The Swiss internships are made possible through a 15-year partnership between NUST and B360. During this period, well over 100 NUST students have each spent three months working at Swiss companies in the banking, information technology and engineering sectors. The partnership between NUST and B360 was established in 2009. The Swiss-based non-governmental organisation works with universities in Namibia, Zambia and South Africa. B360 focuses on skills and knowledge transfer by facilitating the placement of industry experts at southern African universities as volunteer guest lecturers, as well as coordinating industry internships for students from these countries with Swiss organisations.





# GIPE Project Returns in Full Swing in 2025

*The Global Intercultural Project Experience (GIPE) initiative re-launched in 2025, once more bringing together academics and students from four continents to develop solutions for real-world business cases.*

The GIPE Project was first launched in 2020, and is a collaborative initiative between NUST, the Westphalian University of Applied Sciences in Germany, Universidad Católica San Pablo in Peru, and Atma Jaya Catholic University of Indonesia. This initiative brings together students and academics from the four partner institutions to work, remotely and across numerous time zones, on real-life projects provided by businesses in the home country of each institution.

At its core, GIPE aims to foster cultural exchange, enhance understanding, and empower participants to collaboratively address global challenges. A key aspect of this initiative is that each project undertaken has a real client, and the participating students are tasked with delivering a workable solution. This multidisciplinary and project-based approach to learning creates an enriching experience as students develop and apply holistic solutions.

By working alongside young people and academic mentors from various countries, GIPE enables an immersion in new and unfamiliar cultural contexts. The project offers participants a profound opportunity to broaden perspectives, challenge biases, and build networks that transcend geographic

and cultural barriers. GIPE is grounded in its commitment to creating spaces where collaboration leads not only to personal growth, but to real-world solutions that benefit humanity.

Funded by the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) and Erasmus+, GIPE includes a Summer School hosted annually in Gelsenkirchen, Germany. This year, five NUST students, selected from the faculties of Computing and Informatics, and Commerce, Human Sciences and Education respectively, attended from 28 April 2025 to 09 May 2025. They were accompanied by Informatics lecturer Dr Sebastian Mukumbira. During the Summer School, all GIPE participants put the final touches on their solutions and products for the 2025 GIPE Project Client, the community of Untung Jawa Island in Indonesia.

The Summer School programme also included cultural excursions that afforded the participants some time relax and take in the sights of Gelsenkirchen. This included a tour of historical buildings and sites of the German city, as well as a visit to the Bocholt campus of Westphalia University of Applied Sciences.



"GIPE never fails to deliver as an excellent platform for multidisciplinary and project-based learning," Dr Mukumbira said when asked to comment on the initiative. He added that the students had an opportunity to work in project teams remotely alongside German, Peruvian and Indonesian students, and then had the opportunity to meet them in person in Germany. Dr Mukumbira also highlighted the holistic development of the GIPE participants, pointing to their personal and academic growth, the broadening of their mindsets and the evolution of their worldview and perspectives. "All this is thanks to GIPE."

Originally, the GIPE project ran from 2020 to 2023. With new funding secured, the project was re-launched earlier this year and will run until 2027. The ongoing success of the GIPE projects since 2020 now serve as a reference model, acting as a potential building block for collaborative partnerships. The GIPE model combines virtual and in-person international exchange and collaboration. This type of internationalisation activity is growing in popularity among universities from across the world.



## NUST Joins Global 5G Learning Initiative

In April, the Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST), in partnership with Aalto University in Finland, Addis Ababa University in Ethiopia, and Obafemi Awolowo University in Nigeria, launched a Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) project.


The initiative focuses on exploring 5G applications for business and entrepreneurship in emerging markets. Out of a total of 150 registered students, Namibia had the privilege to register 30. "The project consisted ten online lectures, five group work sessions, three presentation slots, and a final exam/quiz. This was an inter-disciplinary, voluntary and non-credit-bearing course", said Dr Gabriel Nhinda, coordinator of the course at NUST, and a lecturer in the Department of Informatics, Faculty of Computing and Informatics.

During the hybrid launch at NUST, both participating Universities praised the organisers for an innovative cross-border learning and teaching experience aimed at internationalising their campuses. Prof Abiade Akeem Tijani from the Obafemi Awolowo University in Nigeria said that the training is "testiment to the power of global collaboration."

Acting Executive Dean of the Faculty of Computing and Informatics at NUST, Prof Fungai Bhunu-Shava expressed her excitement of one of the modules that is a "human-centred design prototyp and pilot of 5G products and mobile services" controlled in student communities to allow them to provide solutions to livelihoods in nearby villages. Meanwhile, Prof Jyri Hämäläinen, Vice President (Research) at Aalto University called on the participating students to challenge their lecturers to examine each idea and urged them to have fascinating strategies that will bring impact to their societies.

The four Units covered throughout the course were: 5G mobile technologies; human-centred design, prototyping and piloting of 5G products and mobile services; introduction to entrepreneurship and business models, commercialisation and finance.

The 5G for Business and Entrepreneurship COIL project was funded by the European Union through Erasmus Plus Mobility.
